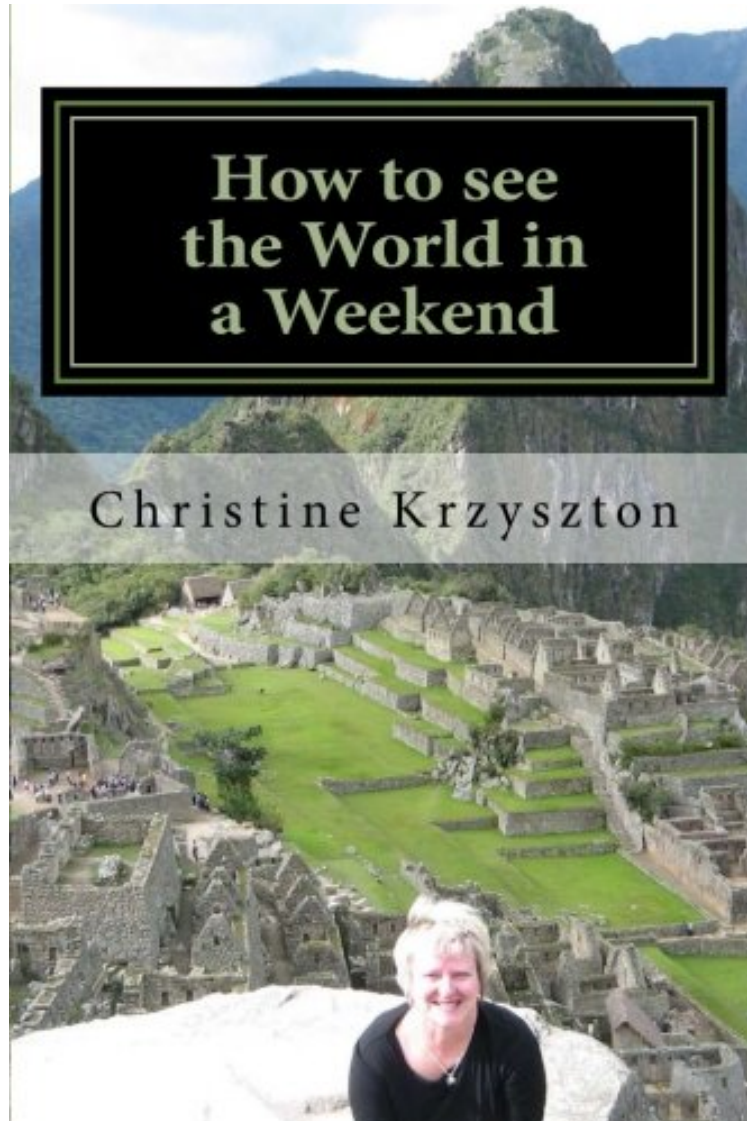

The book is 110 pages, double spaced, of which over half consists of 3-5 page vignettes on her travels. Nice, but not what I really wanted. The first part of the book goes into the basics - the absolute basics - of cheap travel. OK, but nothing you can't find on flyer talk or one of the (many, many) travel blogs. Could be helpful if you know little/nothing about travel, but, again, not much you can't find pretty quickly on the internet. The information is very basic, mostly little more than a web site and a brief description on what you can do on the site. I would have preferred more detail. One observation: once you get past the basics, a lot of strategies for loading up on frequent flyer miles involve applying for credit cards that offer a lot of bonus points as an incentive for signing on. Many internet sites pushing "cheap" travel, including some referenced in this book, are compensated affiliates of the credit card companies. Apply due diligence, read the fine print, and learn the plusses and minuses before getting into card "churning" and other travel hacks.

If you travel where everyone else wants to go when everyone else wants to go there, you will spend more for your travel experiences, be no more interesting that you were last year and get very little value for your travel dollar. When you throw away the destination, you open up the possibility to see the world, and travel like you never thought you could. If you have limited allotted travel time, like to travel on a budget without sacrificing style, and are open to just a few unique travel ideas, you're sure to be inspired with the information you'll find in How to see the World in a Weekend.
