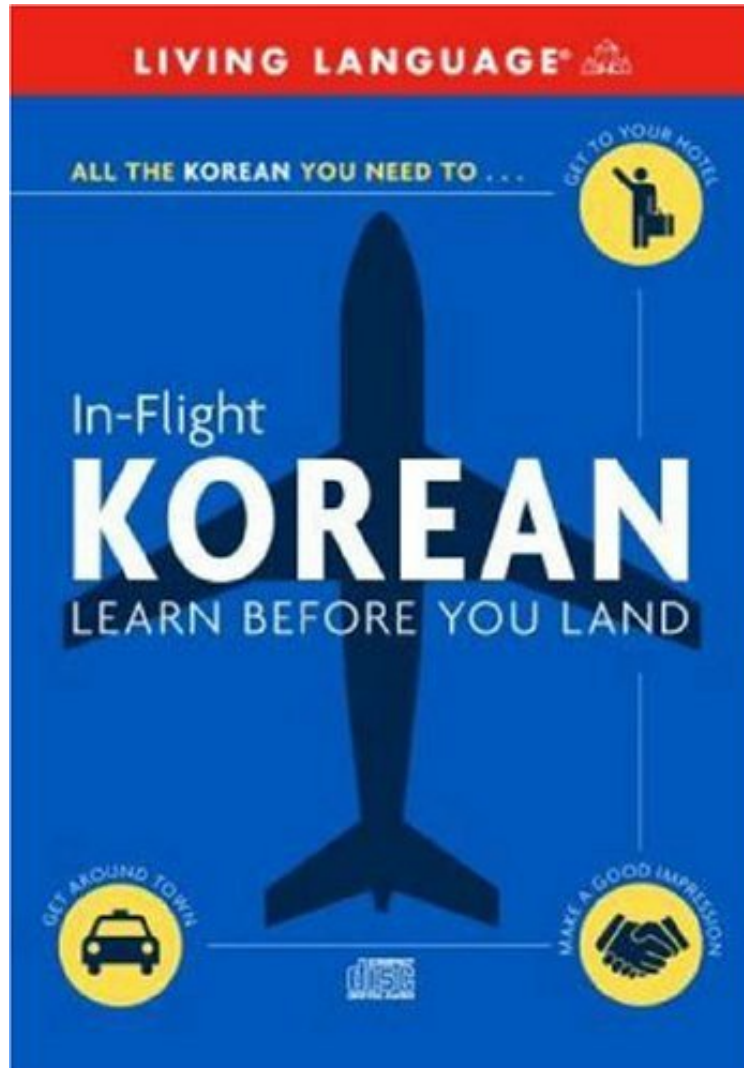

By Apollo Latimer The CD and book set are good for review but for learning Korean with prior exposure. If you are new to learning Korean this is a difficult crash course. The lessons go by extremely fast and the sentences spoken by the native Korean speaker are not articulated for punctuation. You will spend time guessing and hoping that it sounds right (Not good if you need to interact). I used this as a reference to try to understand the language so I would know what some of the K-pop singers were saying. I learned a few words but you would have to listen to this CD for close to a month before you

were able to learn the supposed language in an hour (disc is 68 minutes). Even more confusing was the inclusion of Chinese numbers with Korean (talk about difficult). Good concept, but fails in effectiveness. There are better and more effective ways to learn than this. I paid a penny for it. I would have been upset if I paid more than that. Ford I listened to the audio book version downloaded from my local public library website. The product offers a selection of useful phrases, grouped by category - at the airport, at a restaurant, etc. Phrases are usually said once in English, once in Korean. (In the Numbers chapter everything is said twice.) The Korean speaker is female, so male students looking to imitate a native male voice will be disappointed. Some phrases are said too quickly, but listeners with media players such as OverDrive Media Console can slow down the playback speed. At a minimum, listeners need good rote memorization skills, the patience to listen to the recording multiple times and a preference for auditory-only learning styles in order to use this product. Beyond that, only those who've studied Korean for one year at university AND who want a quick review before getting on the plane to Korea for the first time will benefit from listening to it. This is because typical first-year Korean courses don't usually include such information as "Help!", "Stop, thief!", or "Please call an ambulance."
