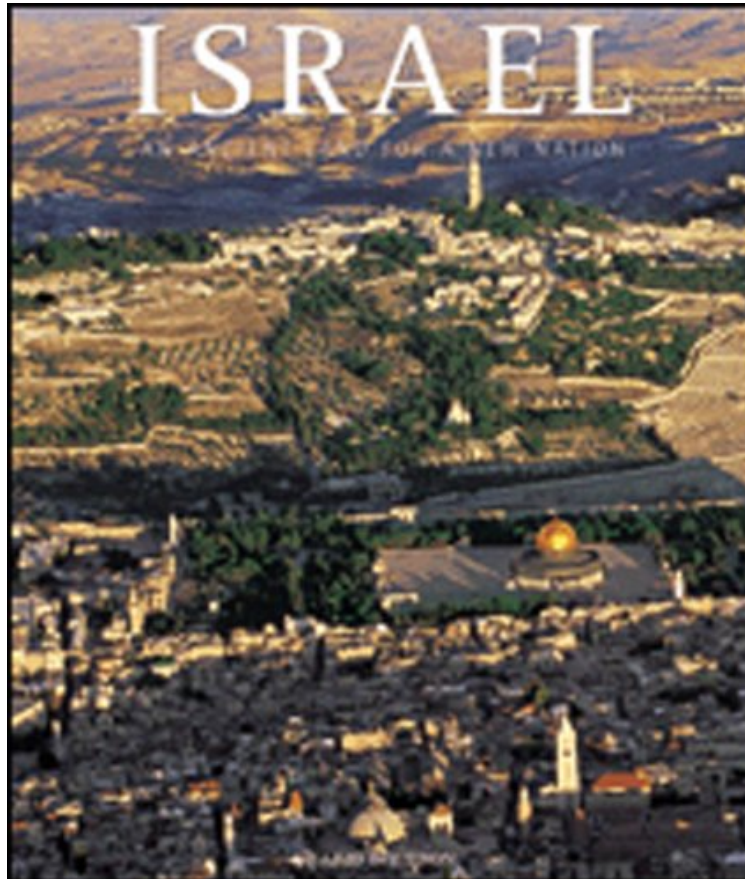

I am reading a copy of this book, borrowed from a library in preparation for trip to Israel later this year. Unfortunately, it's hard for me to give it 4 stars, or even 3, because the book is marred by the most extraordinarily bad case of proofreading that I

have ever seen. Some examples: "far approximately three hundred days a year...". Presumably, "for approximately..." "Their spore and brusque way of speaking ..." Spore? I think that's some kind of seed. Presumably, what is meant is "spare". "at one of the most dangerous points along its borders..." Presumably, "along its borders". "Moses decided to keep his people." Presumably, "free his people". "Jerusalem had been divided into two parts". No comment... Fire the proofreader, or perhaps there never was one. Hire a proofreader.

This introduction to Israel presents the young nation's complex history, unique cultures, and stirring landscape. Photographs convey the incongruous juxtapositions that exist throughout Israel: the ancient city of Hebron and the modern skyline of Tel Aviv, the mosques and the Wailing Wall, and many others.
