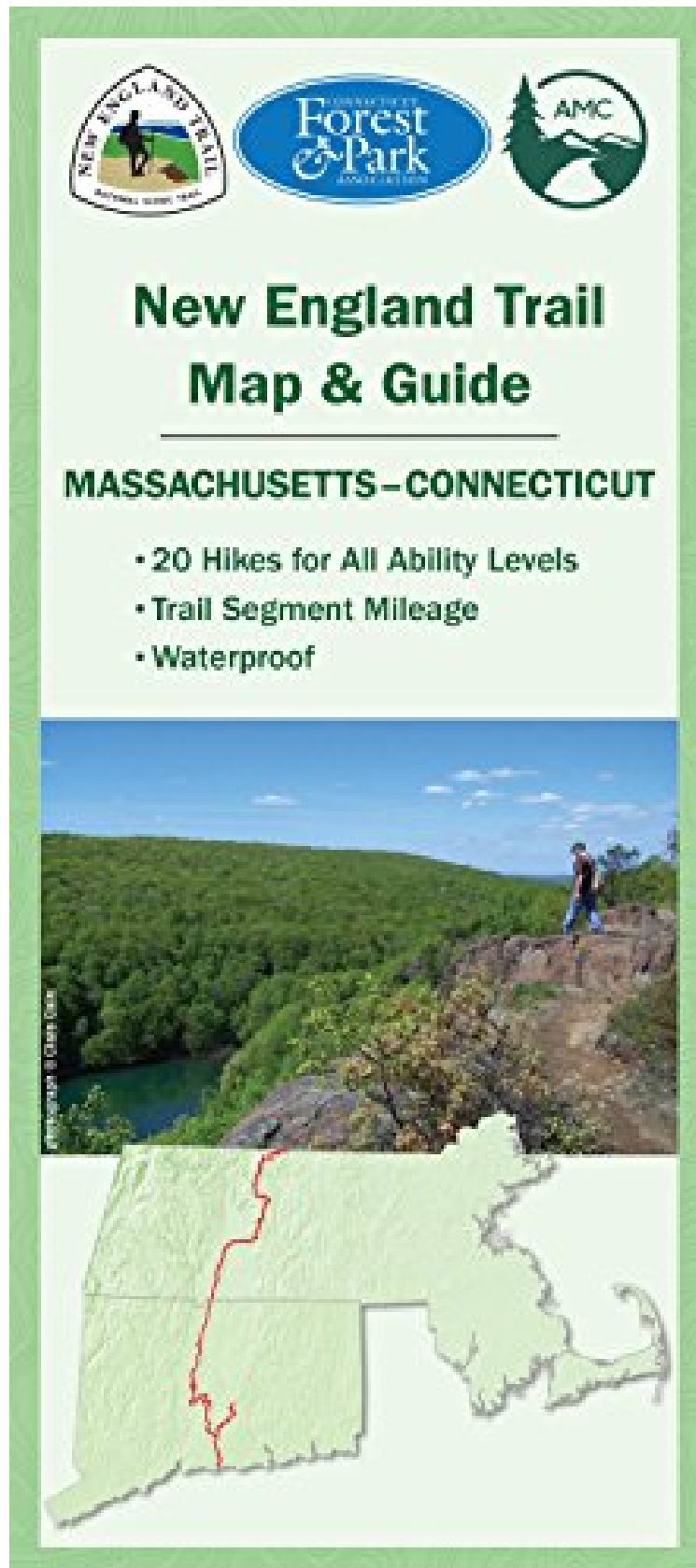

What hiking map does not provide contour lines?! The answer: This one. Also, while it does provide mileages for trail segments, this does leave something to be desired since they are really long segments and do not provide shorter mileages for shorter segments that would make it easier to use while out on the trail. I am very happy with the way the map came out although there are some evolutionary phases I hope it goes through in future revisions. Still, it's so much better than all the other stuff that wasn't available before. I take my hiking cap off in thanks for all the effort and hours this must have taken. The map itself is made of sturdy feeling stock but is still easily folded and managed. It's waterproof and pretty easy to read even in dim conditions. Happily, the trail route stands out and is easy to locate. The size of the sheet is large enough to have lots of points on display at once so there is less shuffling of smaller sheets. Maybe could use a few larger scale inset detail maps and maybe fewer photos. All of that aside, you should probably have a copy. 0 of 0 people found the following review helpful. Helpful maps. By Kite This set of maps (one for Massachusetts, one for Connecticut) contains a wealth of information on the New England Trail (NET). Both maps are large and feel sturdy, which leads me to think that they could handle the rigours of the trail. They provide not only information on the NET, but also some side trails that are recommended as day hikes for various ability levels. Some helpful notation for these side trails are on the presence of fees, the allowance of pets, and whether activities such as skiing or snowshoeing are practical. Some details that may be helpful to know about these maps are: The maps use shaded relief rather than contour lines. The maps have a symbol for areas off the trail that might contain trails not noted on the map, though some areas with notable trails are not marked (e.g. the Tully Trail). Shelter sites are limited on the trail and no alternative options are suggested. The sturdiness of the maps means a bit of additional weight. Overall I find these two maps to be a great addition to the collection, and would recommend them to anyone who plans to hike the trail.

This two-map set is the indispensable day-hiker's companion to the entire 215-mile-long New England National Scenic Trail. Following portions of the Metacomb and Mattabesett trails, the New England Trail, as it's known colloquially, extends up the center of Connecticut and Massachusetts, from Long Island Sound to the New Hampshire border. The map and guide pairs two topographical trail maps one for each state with relevant information such as safety tips, Leave No Trace, natural history, and more. Twenty suggested hikes include; Ragged Mountain Preserve, Bluff Head, and Seven Falls in Connecticut; and Mount Tom, Royalston Falls, and Erving Ledges-Hermit Mountain in Massachusetts. A collaboration between the trail's maintainers the Appalachian Mountain Club and the Connecticut Forest Park Association in conjunction with the National Park Service, this map and guide is the ultimate resource for anyone seeking to day hike or thru hike this stunningly beautiful National Scenic Trail.
