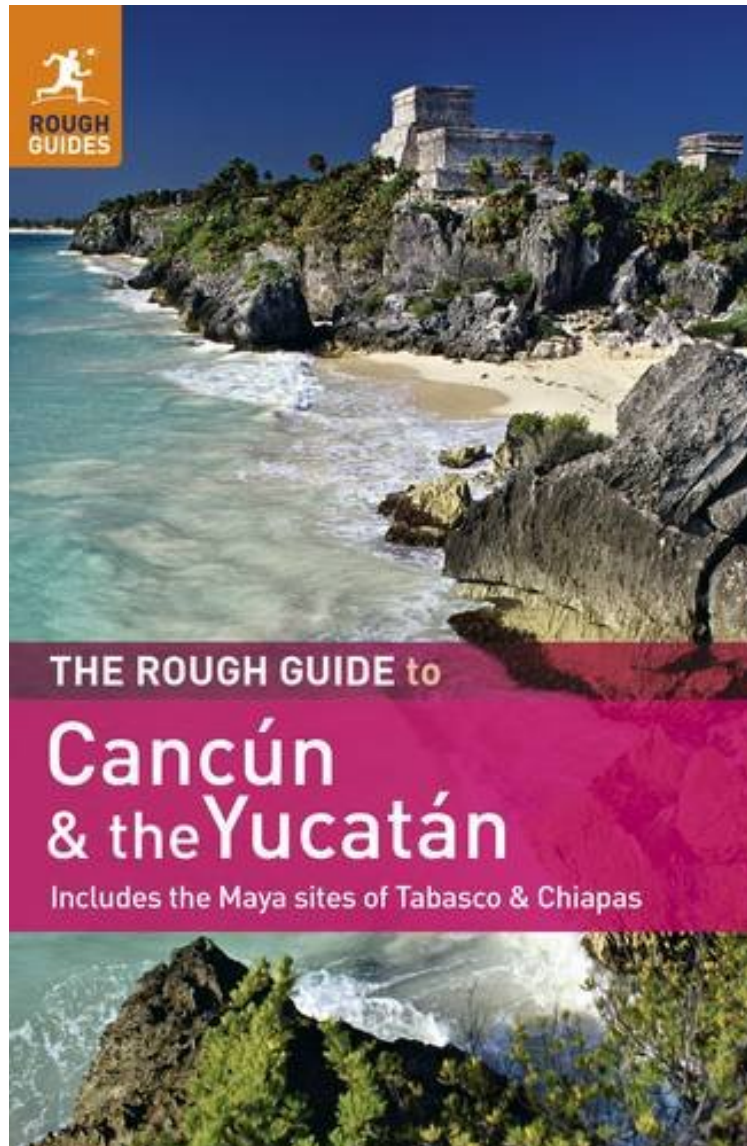

The guide answered most of our questions and helped us figure out what we wanted to do. We were in Playa del Carmen and visited Chichen Itza, Ek Balam, Cozumel and Tulum. The guide is not extremely detailed, but there's enough information to push you in the right direction. It was the best guide I could find on for this particular area South of Cancun (there's lots of literature on Cancun proper, but not as much about the surrounding areas.) This book was not very helpful for Tulum and the nearby cenotes. First, the lodging and restaurant reviews of Tulum were either wrong or non-existent. For example, they recommend this "good" bakery which was poor, but ignored the big-box store around the corner which had a great fresh bakery. There is no mention of nearby big-box stores where you can buy supplies like water and beach towels at a fair price. Their restaurant recommendations were for expensive and not impressive meals. As for the cenotes, there is no explanation of Dos Ojos or a clear section on it. It is one of the most spectacular of all the cenotes, and the price and tour times for Rio Secreto were way off. They did not provide any good information on access to the beach in Tulum (I recommend Playa Paraiso-parking, showers, bathrooms, food, nice chairs recliners.) Also, their advice in taking out insurance for a rental car is way wrong. Most visa cards cover property damage and the whole schtick that the rental car agencies try to pull over on us at the check-out counter is shameful. I paid \$125 for a rental car for 8 days unlimited mileage. If I would have taken out the insurance, I would have paid about \$600. Mexico is not the U.S. as far as personal injury lawsuits are concerned. Just give your regular insurance information and leave.
