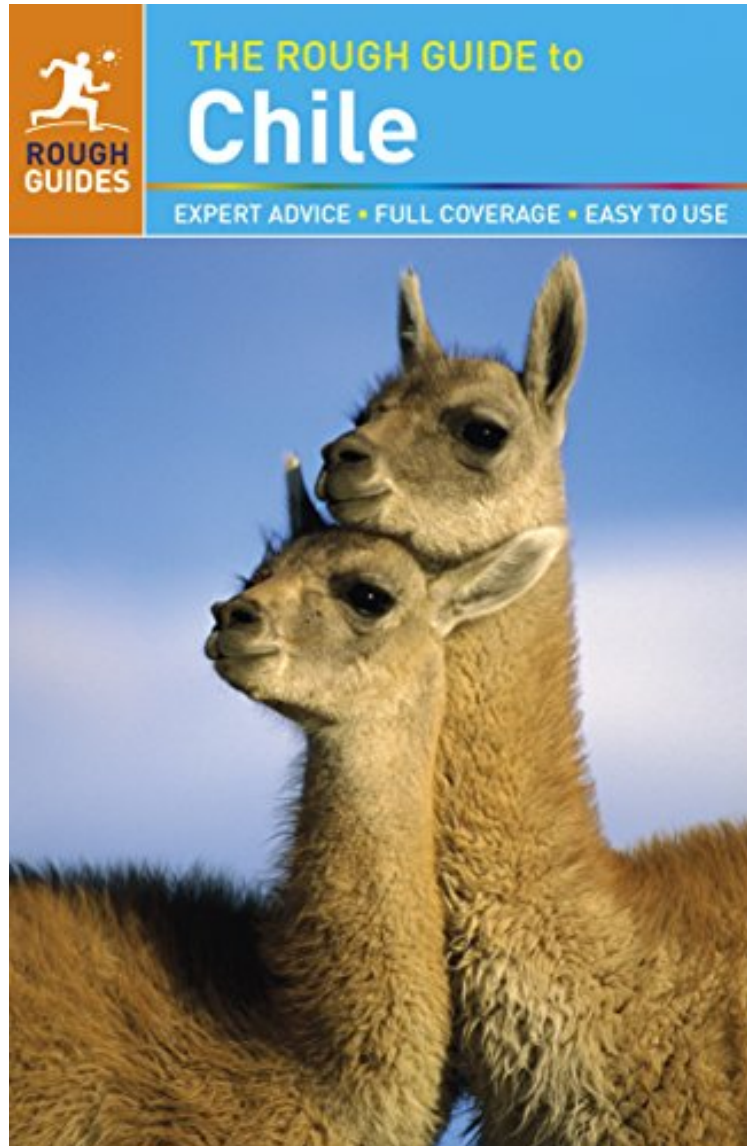

When it comes to The Rough Guide of Chile however I noticed a couple of errors. I visited Chile in March this year. The first one was in Santiago. I wanted to visit Cerro San Cristobal

on 14. March. To get to the top of San Cristobal there is a funicular. When I arrived the funicular was still closed for the season and would not open till the last day of March. Climbing the hill at my age was out of the question and the substitute bus only ran every half hour and was overcrowded. Didn't check up on that Roug Guide, did you? The second error occurred in Valparaiso. I wanted to visit the museum of Lord Thomas Cochrane but it was closed or rather there was a completely different exhibition of cartoons there. That must have happened several months before I visited Valparaiso. I hope these errors will be corrected. I have unfortunately had problems contacting Rough Guide about that.
