Anthony Daniels' (better known by his pen name Theodore Dalrymple) brilliant prose--which had me laughing several times--is paired with his incredible adventures to countries which, when all others were fleeing communism, had chosen to steer into the skid and double down on the brutal ideology. Nobody does a better job of finding the big picture in little situations (or in big ones), or finding misanthropically/curmudgeonly humorous ways to describe his encounters. regimes. The lack of freedom, the drab monotony, the deathly sapping of life these regimes have on their inhabitants are clearly delineated by Dalrymple who visits a range of countries where the Marxist experiment has been tried, and found severely wanting. Highlights include a visit to a North Korea department store: fascinating in its depiction of a socio-economic system that has long taken leave of basic human needs and occupies a surreal hyper-reality well along the 'wilder shores of Marx'. Those brave pioneers of the Russian revolution, not to mention Marx himself, have a lot to answer for.

The author, whose father was a member of the Communist Party, decided to travel to five countries that are still avowedly Marxist. His journeyings took him to three continents and have produced a book that is both travel literature and a commentary on Marxist politics.
